Caboose sports a new look

A major project was completed just in time for Railroad Days – and the Southern Pacific 4049 Bay Window Caboose had a fresh coat of paint for the big event. "It looks really good," said a pleased Stu Proctor, chairman of the Railroad Operations Committee (ROC), formed five years ago to tackle rehabilitation of the Southern California Scenic Railway Association's two historic cabooses. Team members devoted at least two Saturdays a month to repair and spruce up the interior of the caboose built in 1961 and prepare the exterior for new paint. Member Wendell Hanks led a research of the railroad's paint history and found a source for the authentic colors. Axalta Coating Systems matched the color chips and supplied the paint, which was applied by a painting contractor using rollers in late April.

American railroading during World War II

World War II had a tremendous effect on the American railroads. Still struggling to recover from the Great Depression, most of the railroads were close to bankruptcy and had little modern power or equipment to support the war effort - with many of their old, decrepit locomotives and dilapidated railcars sitting in mile long "dead lines." By most accounts, the attack on Pearl Harbor and subsequent U.S. entry into the Second World War caught the rail industry flat-footed.

The job of carrying men and machinery during the war years from December 1941 until well after the war ended rested squarely on the railroads — and every car and locomotive was pressed into emergency service. Out of necessity, the worn-out rolling stock on the rip tracks was brought out of retirement because the need was so great. No funds were available to upgrade physical plants that had suffered from over 10 years of deferred maintenance due to the depression.

Civilian passenger traffic was seriously hampered as passenger equipment was diverted to troop train service --scheduled passenger trains could be annulled due to a lack of available engines or coaches, but troop trains could not.

Going to war on a troop train was often a harrowing experience, as reported by the Utah State Historical Society. They quote this remembrance from a Union Pacific Station Agent in Provo, Utah:

These boys didn't know where they were going. There were not enough seats for every man, so they rode where they could. They had no way of cleaning themselves up, they had whiskers and they were dirty. There were so many of them. Those poor boys would ride for days and nights getting to where they needed to go. They would sleep in the aisle or anywhere they could curl up and get a little rest.

The westbound trains carried troops to the ports where the boys would embark on ships to places unknown. Many of the east bound trains through Provo were loaded with the wounded and marked with big red crosses on the sides of each railcar. When the train would arrive, those who could, would get off to stretch their muscles for a few moments and walk up and down the platform. It was a sad deal seeing ... the fellows on crutches and bandaged up.

Freight trains were heavily guarded and when they stopped; armed Military Police would disembark to protect the loaded cars and locomotives from sabotage or other harm. Tank cars carried gasoline and diesel fuel, boxcars transported munitions. Tanks, trucks, jeeps and artillery pieces rode on heavily loaded flatcars

Locomotives of every sort were pressed into service, some dating to long before World War I. Most motive power was steam – diesel-electric locomotives were in their infancy — and most diesel production was diverted to the war effort. Orders for new engines had to go before the War Production Board for approval and were many times denied. The railroad had to prove a need for the locomotive before a purchase order would be approved.

The War Production Board would sometimes split an engine order between two or more railroads; an example of such "sharing" was Southern Pacific's order for 14 GS-6 Golden State streamlined 4-8-4's. The Board initially turned down the order but approved it when quick thinking SP explained that "GS" meant 'General Service," not "Golden State." The WPB increased the order to 16 engines, but diverted six to the Western Pacific.

Because the railroads were so integral to the successful movement of men and *matériel* for the war effort, employees were exempt from military service. Truly, the men and women of the American railroads did much to help America prevail.

The pupils were so excited to see the insides of the three cabooses and two lounge cars, learn how each car was used and get a behind-thescenes peek at the lives of railroaders during the mid-20th century.
